

Tips On Becoming a Better Rider – Part 2

Last month's President's Column focused on tips to become a better rider. We covered items such as the proper use of first gear at stops, leg and foot position, the benefit of talking to yourself, paying strict attention to the task at hand, and developing the discipline to look further into the distance, or as I like to call it. "Your Future!"

This month I have a few more words that may provoke some critical thinking on your part to help you become a better motorcyclist. Let's begin.

Practice Technique

Most of us would consider ourselves fairly competent riders with many miles and years of riding under our belts. However, throw a new "task" at any one of us and we may fail – miserably. A few months ago I participated in a riding clinic designed to enhance my slow speed, precision riding abilities (Figure 1). How did I do? I give myself a solid "C". Average. That's right! After 50 years of riding motorcycles and countless miles, I found my Achilles heel. Going slow in a tight controlled manner takes an entirely different skill-set. So, I urge you all to go out and take a slow-speed riding clinic, or at least take some cones to a parking lot and practice tight circles and figure 8's. Remember practice does NOT make "perfect"! Only perfect practice makes "perfect"!

Cover The Controls

A few months ago I spent quite a bit of time talking about effective motorcycle braking. You must practice braking technique to get the most out of your brakes; marvels of modern engineering. But let's step back for a moment.




Figure 2 - From motorcycletesttips.com

From the moment you decide to engage your brakes until you actually stop is made of up two components: 1) the riders reaction time and 2) actual braking distance. Take a look at Figure 2. When a

rider's speed is 50 mph, it will take the average rider 175 feet to stop. That is more than onehalf the length of a football field. Note that of the total braking distance, almost 30%—or 50 feet is consumed as reaction time. Recall, as we age our reaction time slows. Developing the discipline of covering the front brake and clutch in heavy traffic or perceived upcoming traffic dangers can reduce your reaction time and aid in decreasing your overall stopping distance. Covering your controls can mean the difference between stopping safely or crashing.

Be Blind Spot Aware

After a crash between a motorcycle and a car, the driver of the vehicle usually says, "I didn't even see him/her!" Non-seeing could be a result of either the inattentiveness of the driver, or the motorcyclist's poor choice of lane positioning. Make certain you are always visible. It is incredibly easy to hide a motorcycle in traffic.

Don't linger in the blind spots of other vehicles. Remember, if you can't see the driver in their side view mirrors, they can't see you.

Motorcycles have blind spots, too. Before changing lanes always make a head-check (turn your head) to insure a vehicle is not hiding in your blind spot. The Irish call them "life-checks". I like that term.

Fight Over-confidence

I've spoken with many riders who could not wait to regale me with the daring deeds on a motorcycle. Their story usually starts with, "One time..." and then the yarn begins. There is a great difference between a confident and an over-confident rider. The confident rider is one who works on mastering the craft of motorcycling. For the confident rider every ride is an opportunity to improve their skill level. Confident riders are self-critiquing.

Over-confident riders critique others. Every ride is an opportunity to try to impress their pillion passenger, riding buddies, or just get another adrenaline rush. Their motorcycle is an ego extension.

The over-confident rider pushes the limits and rarely learns from their mistakes. A crash is usually blamed on anything other than their own behavior and lack of self-discipline.

If you find you are scaring yourself—slow down. Concentrate on technique rather than speed. Never let your brain write a check that your skills can't cash!




Oregon Back Country Discovery Maps Available

April, 2018 CW Ambassador Rides

Do you get tired of riding the same old roads, even eating at the same old places? Sure, throwing that leg over the seat of your favorite motorcycle, pressing the starter button, and then adroitly maneuvering through whatever lies ahead is exhilarating; but, can it be better? Even flying jet airplanes on the same routes can begin to get boring and lead to complacency, which can have tragic consequences. Why not liven up things a bit—not by increasing speed and adrenaline-laden risks; but, by joining some new and old friends to explore new roads to some destinations freshened up with slightly different venues?

That's exactly what eight of us on seven bikes did on our March Ambassador's ride. **Brian Scott**—a long term member whom we hadn't seen for a long time—and his wife, **Laura**, were lured out with us by the prospect of riding new backroads. They found six other welcoming BMWRO family members eager to share the day with them.

Today, the southern Willamette Valley attempts to cast a pall over our plans with a low overcast; but we cannot be deterred. Our attitudes are up, as are the temperatures which brought ice the prior month, forcing a postponement of this same

plan. It's 39°F at 8:30 a.m. That isn't exactly an appealing riding temperature, but it is warm enough for us to get through a little fog and drizzle on Highway 126 to a forecasted 54°F on the coast. We arrive on schedule at Coffee Roasters in Florence to pick up two of our riders. There is enough delay created by the wait for the single restroom that our hard-core coffee drinkers grab a quick cup. We will ride nearly 300 miles today, so I encourage all to get underway without further delay (so that we don't have to rush lunch or other brief stops). Most want to be home by about 4:30 or 5:00.

We ride in two groups along familiar Highway 101 toward our backroad entry just north of the **Conde B. McCullough Memorial Bridge.** We regroup at the Vietnam Memorial just before the bridge that was built in the 1930's to cross Coos Bay. This mile-long (5,305 foot) bridge is on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places. We exit east off of Highway 101 at the traffic light before the bridge and take the East Bay road through the one-store town of Glasgow. The

road climbs with twists and turns along the bay's northern shore and then descends to cross Kentuck Inlet. We pass through Cooston, hardly noting it, and then cross Coos River to join the South Coos River Highway toward Eastside. Catching Slough Road—our desired route—exits left, but we continue a couple miles for a restroom stop. Coffee drained, we U-turn back to follow Catching Slough. This route meanders through farm country and along the slough's riparian vegetation before we join Old Wagon Road. Then, a right turn onto Coos-Sumner Road excites each of us with its hairpin turns before we reach Highway 101 just before the bifurcation with Highway 42. With all of us jazzed from these new roads, we glide along 101 until rolling to a stop at Tony's Crab Shack along the Coquille's river mouth.

Tony's Crab Shack with its copious and reasonable prices garners 4–stars on Yelp's 334 reviews. Each of us finds our favorite item: oyster sandwich, clam chowder, hamburger, fish and chips, etc. We've ridden a long

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way, much of it on curvy country roads. The sky has turned mostly blue. We enjoy a little extra time in the restaurant and along the waterfront. The sun feels warm, and the air is fresh.

We depart on Highway 101 North, but stay on it only briefly turning east onto North Bank Lane. We roll along the Northshore of the Coquille River passing farms and cattle until we merge onto Highway 42 toward Coos Bay. We drop into Roaster's in Florence for coffee and chit-chat, all except for Bob Whitlock. He has to rush home to let his doggie out for a potty break. Today was one of our longer single-day rides, but there were no complaints, except maybe by Bob's dog. Everybody has enjoyed the new roads, the food, and the fellowship. As the Activity Coordinator, Chris Henry reviewed the upcoming BMWRO events on the calendar: Chief Joseph Rally in John Day June 28, 29, 30. **Keith Matteson** spoke briefly about the Sixes River Campout that he is hosting July 27 & 28, Saturday dinner will be provided by the club. Alice LeBarron spoke briefly about the Walton Lake Campout scheduled for Sept. 7th-8th-which will be the site for our next quarterly club meeting. Saturday dinner will be provided by the club. The Women Riders Campout is scheduled for Sept. 14th-15th. Alice reports that the ExCom has heard from several members wishing to have another campout at the Steens. 
A Rainy Run to Monmouth NW Ambassadors Ride Report April 2018

But it sure did dampen attendance. When it was time to roll, seven stalwarts had made their way to the start. On a warm Friday pre-ride, a couple of weeks earlier, no fewer than ten of us wended our way to Monmouth. We're beginning to think that the propensity to ride and sunny, dry weather are correlated!

After giving the rest of you a few more minutes to show, we were off! And off, we should note, under threatening skies, but so far anyway, along dry pavement. David was this train's engine, rolling westward while responding like Pavlov to his GPS. Close behind were James Kim, Charles and Joy Trapp, Jeff Yarnall, and Mark Wegener.

Today's destination was Monmouth, home to Western Oregon University. Like Lebanon last month, one can blast there in about an hour. But the challenge on each ride is to find the road not taken, and this pursuit can turn an hour ride into an all day affair. Today's route would swing us to the west of Carlton and McMinnville before heading south. We quickly pranced through the stoplights of Tigard, and continued into the estates and vinevards of suburban Sherwood. There are dozens of roads that traverse this section of the Willamette Valley, now officially designated the Chehalem Mountains American Viticultural Area. After a very twisty and scenic stretch from Edv to Bell Roads, we found ourselves north of Newberg and back in the flatlands.

Spring riding in Oregon is among the most sublime treats of the year. There is always something sweet in the air, along with the falling dogwood pedals. And the vistas are magnificent, green and lush wherever you look. That can be a problem on a motorcycle at speed, but we know these roads well,

and beyond that, our motto is "Safety first." We continued west toward Carlton, anxious to finally cross the urban growth boundary. Therefore, it was with mixed emotions that we encountered development construction on Hill Road. A detour accommodated a reroute of this key urban barrier, which itself was accommodating a bevy of new homes. It was then we decided it was time for a coffee break. As we removed our helmets, it began to rain.

Thirty warm minutes later, the rain had become steady. Undaunted, we pulled on the GORE-TEX® and began anew. Some of the best riding lay ahead: Peavine Road to Youngblood Hill to Muddy Valley to Gopher Valley. Eventually, we hit real traffic again on OR-18, but for a moment only, as we exited at Sheridan and ramped over the freeway into rural Polk County. The rain was intense, but the increasingly Soggy Seven handled it well.

We avoided Dallas, preferring to loop to the west (Ellendale to Oakdale—a fine alternative to the stoplights in town). South of Dallas, we revved it up across the Kings Valley. Named for its first settler, Nahum King, the valley extends some 27 miles toward Philomath. OR-223 runs its length, one of the finest stretches of road the state has to offer. Today we only ventured halfway, for we were past Monmouth and it was time for lunch.

Grain Station Brewery Works is new to Monmouth. Formerly J's 99 Grill, McMinnville-based Grain Station expanded its operation in January. Most of the old staff and menu stayed and

the food and service were okay. The restaurant's back room is a little sterile, but it mattered not a bit, as we were all just glad to be able to be in away from the rain.

We lingered as long as we could, until the weather looked like it was breaking. As we departed town, it was clear the break was a head fake. No matter. With full bellies and working electrics, the ride was surprising comfortable.

Although lunch was on OR-99, an easy escape from town, we chose to backtrack a couple of blocks and tour the campus instead. WOU was established in 1856 as Monmouth

University. It now incorporates colleges of education and liberal arts and sciences, educating approximately 6,000 students.

As we picked up speed after crossing the campus, the rain picked up as well. A few lefts and rights put us on OR-22, but only for a few moments. A left on Greenwood Road quickly whisked us away from mainline traffic. Across open fields, we teed into aptlynamed Farmer Road, then quickly climbed toward Eagle Crest on Orchard Heights Road. Up and over on Gibson Road, then a left on Brush College found us back in the lowlands again. The rain was steady as we raced along Webfoot Road into Dayton.

It was three-thirty – time to go our separate ways. But thumbs up all around made one thing crystal clear – rain or shine, the Soggy Seven would be riding high again soon. Even Mike. Although he's moving to Arizona, he's keeping a bike in town with First Saturdays in mind.
