So Joe and I headed south to our getaway cabin in Weed (the guest room above Russell and Kathe's garage). We arrived in time for a wonderful concert on the lawn by local musicians Tom and Leslie. It was a chance to enjoy the music, a chilled beverage and meet some locals.

That socializing resulted in an invitation to visit Mowatt Apiaries the next day. We got a great explanation from the owners about how honey is processed. Later that afternoon we sampled the improved offerings at Mt. Shasta Brewing. This is where the good fortune of visiting Russell and Kathe becomes clear... we parked the bikes and employed the Subaru for all of the pub crawls if distances were too far to walk. The next morning Russell rolled out his bike and Kathe headed towards Chico in the car, all set to meet us at the historic B & B we had reserved.

As it turned out Kathe got to visit Sierra Brewing all by herself because after a fabulous ride on 89 through Mt. Lassen National Park the three of us on bikes got stuck on a hot detour. We did arrive in time for dinner (at a place recommended by the staff at the Sierra tasting room.) We stayed at the 1874 Durham House south of Chico. It's a beautifully restored Italianate mansion with lovely gardens and pool.

The next day we headed west on 20 to Ukiah and from there on 253 to Boonville, home of Anderson Valley Brewing. Kathe chauffeured us up to their tap room just outside of town. We had fun there, but were surprised that such a large and popular facility did not offer any meals. That's okay, walking distance from our hotel we found a delicious dinner at Lauren's, including a bottle of the local sparkling wine. We should have staved another night at the comfortable and funky Boonville Hotel. The Anderson Valley features many vineyards and we could have added wine tasting to the brewery tour.

All that toasting did not prevent us from another early start the following morning. Starting northbound on 128 we soon reached Highway 1. Even a short segment on that ultimate riding road is worth the trip. And then, just when you are getting sad to leave the stunning coast, you reach the Redwoods. The Lost Coast and cruising up the Avenue of the Giants is the perfect day for a motorcyclist. We caught up with Kathe in Eureka. When she got to town she found us rooms recently re-opened Eureka Inn. I loved the period ambiance of the 1922 hotel, and they loved motorcycles. They offered us locked, secure parking inside the pool courtyard. And it is walking distance



For riders who are serious about the back roads, the July announcement was tantalizing: Come join us if you are curious about visiting Mt. St. Helens without touching I-5. We would like to believe that it was solely the route that captured their interest, but mild temps and crystal clear skies didn't hurt either.

Carol Lamper joined the procession as we passed through Banks. A group of this size can be unwieldy, but Susan Ortiz-Renteria was a very capable sweep and René Renteria advanced the science of ride management by floating in the middle of the pack, effectively breaking the band into two groups. A prized Australian cattle dog couldn't have guided its herd any better.


When one considers riding to Mt. Saint Helens from Portland, he or she pulls out a map and look up and slightly to the right. But when one's goal is to entertain a group while avoiding I-5, the route heads slightly south, then west, then north, then east, with lots of twists and turns in between.

We were proceeding apace, until two unfortunate events occurred. First, an innocuous announcement at the Vernonia gas stop sent the bulk of the group off in literally a different direction. As we were saddling up, David reminded folks to look for the next major intersection. "Turn right towards Apiary, about ten miles up the road." THE LONG WAY TO JOHN DAY

My riding partner, Dick Vigue and I decided to go to this years annual BMW rally in John Day, but take a longer route to get there. He had never been to Sun Valley so we decided to ride there and then back to John Day for the rally

The first day took us from Myrtle Point to Burns by riding to the Diamond Lake junction, south on 97 to the Klamath Marsh, through Christmas Valley and on to Burns. The section across the marsh and on to Silver Lake is a great road for motorcycles as it's little traveled, good paving and lots of curves. If you are ever anywhere near this road, don't miss riding it. The ride from Christmas Valley to Burns, not so much fun.

Our next day took us to Sun Valley. We rode on to I-80 at Ontario then turned off at Twin Falls and on to Sun Valley. It is near the town of Ketchum, Idaho. We stayed two nights in order to do some exploring of the area. I had been there in 1980 on my way to the national rally in Missoula; and actually tent camped at a KOA campground, which is no longer there. The town before Ketchum is Hailey, which is the home town of Bowe Bergdahl. Lots of yellow ribbons around the area but not too many people

talking about it—Ketchum has changed greatly since my previous visit.

We really enjoyed walking around town. Here's one interesting thing about the main street: as it is very busy, crossing the street could be a bit of a challenge. Nearly every other intersection has a traffic light. Those that don't have traffic lights have red flags in holders. You remove the flag, wave it, traffic stops and you cross the street. Once across, you place the flag in the holder and walk on. Lots of interesting places to visit. We walked out to the Sun Valley lodge—a distance of about 1.5 miles. I was surprised to learn that Sun Valley was the first place on earth to have a ski lift. The developer had seen bananas transported by a cable-lift system in South America and wonder why one couldn't use chairs. So he built one and just attached what looked like ordinary chairs to the cable system. So one could say, the rest is history.

One museum had several of the biggest covered wagons I have ever seen. The signs said the were used for hauling ore. They were very tall but narrow. They dwarf what we recognize as a typical Conestoga covered wagon. My guess is they were narrow to allow them to use existing trails. One picture shows a wagon being pulled by a team of 16 pairs of horses. These were some of the longest wagon trains in the country. Once a year, they are removed from the museum and are part of the annual **Wagons Days**Parade. This parade is the largest non-motorized parade in the US. It takes place the last week of August. Next time I go there, I will check the calendar and make sure I see this event.

From Sun Valley, we rode on to Stanley which is in the middle of the Sawtooth Mountain Range. There were spectacular views with great riding along our route and huge ranches as we dropped out of the higher elevations into valleys. It was cold up high but quickly warmed up as we dropped down. We rode down to Payette, Idaho then north to Cambridge, west and down into the Snake River area. We crossed the river at the Oxbow Dam. The ride down to the dam was one of the windiest roads I have ridden. We were just glad we weren't driving trucks or RV's. By now, it was quite warm, in fact the warmest of our trip. After crossing the Snake River, our plan was to follow the Snake River north to Joseph, Oregon, where we were to spend the night. However, the road was closed as they were in the process of redoing the entire road. It was to open on a limited basis the following weekend. We then rode to Halfway and stopped in the shade of a market, got cool drinks and made calls to change our reservations. We rode on to Baker City for the night. Next day, we rode on to Sumpter, through the mountains to Ukiah where we turned south to John Day.

For me, the highlight of this year's rally was the geological/historical tour of the area led by a recently retired John Day Fossil Beds park ranger who worked there for over 17 years. Turned out to be one of the best things we have done lately. Unfortunately, it was raining but the allotted 25 bikes went on the tour anyway. One of the most interesting things was the guide's discussion of the impact of volcanoes on the geology of the area. He said that the

eruption of Mt. Mazama resulted in Crater Lake, had the greatest impact in recent times—which was over 7,000 years ago. Residue from it can be found as far away as Iowa even today. Near Dayville, he pointed out a two-track "road" heading south. It was developed as a military road that ended in Yreka, California. Once home, I used Google Earth™ and was able to easily find this route. Another thing he noted was that school houses were located approximately 11 miles apart. The rule at that time was that schools must be located no further than 5 miles apart if students were to walk there or 11 miles if they rode horses. If you have wondered when you see school houses located in what seems like the middle of nowhere, that is the reason for their existence.

The next day, we headed back toward home. We rode south on the John Day-Burns road then turned west which took us through Paulina and then Post. The temperature was only in the 40's when we left and was guite cold riding. We stopped in Post at the Post General Store for breakfast which was great—and to warm up. Post is the geographical center of Oregon. Interesting place to stop and visit. There is a post office in the general store and looks like one from a 100 years ago. From Post, we rode on to Prineville, Sisters and on home. The day we rode through Prineville and Redmond was flag day. Both cities had American flags about 20' apart all through town on both sides of the street. It was an amazing site. Total miles ridden were 1887.

Edson Creek Campout Amazingly Fun! July 25-27, 2014

Jalene and I were digging the Winter Meeting in Salem, having a great time, when Jay Bennet slides up. "Hey, you guys should revive the Umpqua Campout this summer. It's real easy, just reserve the campsite and that's about it. What do you think?" Uuhh, sure Jay, why not, sounds like fun.

And fun it was! Not at first, mind you, because I learned the hard way about the reservation system for group campsites. On a ride over Bear Creek Summit this spring, we decided we'd just keep it simple – grilled chicken, corn on the cob, and salad. To drink, BYOB. But how to cook all that chicken on our little grills? We happened to be dropping some stuff off at Habitat for Humanity, and there was our savior: a humongous used gas grill for just \$70. Worked perfect. Sold.

Come the day before the campout, I packed it all up in my truck, pitched in a bunch of firewood and folding chairs and coolers, put the bike on the trailer, and headed out early Friday morning feeling like Jed Clampett. My brother, John, and brother-in-law, Cliff, had ridden down from Tacoma to Newport the day before (yeah!),
