

NW Ambassadors Ride Report October 2016



It was a great idea in July when Mike first proposed a ride to Marys Peak near Corvallis. And we would have made it too, with a little more perseverance—not to mention, a little less rain. But like an itch you can't stop scratching, it wouldn't go away. And with the days growing shorter, it was now or never.

Such was the mindset for our October ride.

As the new month approached, we made contingency plans should the weather misbehave once again. And the forecast was not encouraging. But when October 1st dawned, the weather was warm and the pavement was dry. We might get away with it after all!

The memory of our rainy July may have lingered—only seven riders on five bikes set out at the appointed hour. Mike had pre-



ridden the route, so he took the lead. **Chris Henry** fell in behind him, warmed up from the ride from Eugene, and ready to take the long way home. **Kim Dorsing** and **Janice Mathern** joined us from Vancouver, fresh from a scoot to Montana, where they bagged the last of this year's Grand Tour checkpoints. And it was great to see **Steven Polansky**, back from a summer full of weddings ill-timed to coincide



with our rides. **David** and **Diane** brought up the rear, ready to chase down any wayward soul who might head north instead of south.

The great thing about our region is that although many routes are well-traveled, there's always a road or two that can make a familiar route a discovery. McDonald to Beef Bend to Roy Rogers via Elsner is a regular escape from Tigard's urban sprawl. Elwert to Kruger to Bell via Leander are roads less travelled. Likewise, North Valley Road through Yamhill County toward Lafayette is familiar territory, while Briedwell through Perrydale into Dallas is a little less so.

As we rode, the weather only improved. David chuckled to himself as he thought about all those riders who were missing out. After a gorgeous sprint through the King's Valley, it had been a couple of hours in the saddle and our stomachs were grumbling. Or maybe it was the AKRAPOVIČ exhaust can on Chris's new GSA.

Either way, we soon found ourselves seated at a roomy table in the back of **Eats & Treats**— Trip Advisor's #1 restaurant in sprawling Philomath—it was easy to see why, judging by the plates we passed on the way to our table. And while it was a new experience for many of us, it is not a hidden gem: Steve Woodward joined us from Corvallis—and pulled out his frequent eater card. From the tri-tip sandwich to the chicken pot pie, the food was terrific—and gluten free. There's something on the menu for everyone (except, I guess, a glutenphile). And the best part for first time visitors? Free freshly-baked chocolate chip cookies for all!

The roads were still dry when we arrived for lunch; and they remained dry when we left. But clouds had enveloped Marys Peak. However, the cloud ceiling appeared to be low. David was convinced that after a short ride through light fog, we'd pierce through the other side into brilliant sunshine and a gorgeous view of the cloud-shrouded lowland below. And the zippy ride along OR-34's famous carousel corners only heightened the anticipation.

As we made the turn onto Marys Peak Road, bike after bike disappeared into the fog—just



like we expected. What we didn't expect was the rain—and wind that accompanied the fog. Upward we climbed and so did the wind speed. At 4,098 feet, Marys Peak is the highest peak in the Oregon coast range. On this day, the mountain was no match for the cloud. After the quick obligatory group selfie, it was time to hasten our retreat.

Back below the fog line, the weather remained quite civilized. Steve disappeared as quickly as he arrived, and as we reached our

southern apogee, Chris headed home with a wave. The rest of us avoided the worst of Corvallis traffic and headed north. Straight north? Of course not. Approaching Albany, we took a hard left on Granger Avenue through Lewisburg and onto Sulphur Springs and Soap Creek Roads. Making our way north, we were reminded again that the only thing better than a First Saturday Ride is a First Saturday Ride that ends on a ferry! And so it was on the Wheatland Ferry that we celebrated our riding luck and said our goodbyes. Who knows what November will bring...
