Canyonville, OR is about 20 miles south of Roseburg with some fantastic roads for riding your motorcycle. Temperatures in the area in the end of April are forecasted to be in the high 60's to low 70's during the day and mid 40's at night. This will be a great opportunity to explore a new area with other riders. A group ride will be arranged for those of you that would like to join in after the lunch and meeting. The route has yet to be determined and more details will be posted as the time approaches.

For those that would like to spend some time in the area, a small block of rooms has been blocked off at the resort with discounted room rates. For one king bed or two queen beds the rate for Saturday night will be \$115 plus room tax and/or \$95 for Sunday night at members own expense. To reserve a room, call 1-888-677-7771 and let them know you are with BMW Riders of Oregon for those rates. For those of you with motor-homes or travel trailers that wish to bring your home with you, there is a beautiful RV park across the highway, that is part of the resort with 24 hours a day shuttle service. Both the hotel and the RV resort have a heated indoor pool and hot tubs. Rates for the RV park for April 2017 have not yet been established. To reserve at the RV Resort, call

**541–839–3599**. There is also free RV dry camping in one of the Resort's parking lots. For the real hardy tent campers (since temperatures are usually in the mid 40's at night at the end of April), Stanton Park is within walking distance, at a rate of \$15 per night for tents and \$23 for full RV hook-ups. ## Rolling on... Traction – Can I Have Pepperoni With that Please?


The other day I mounted up to ride to the coast. Many of you

may have already seen the images posted on our BMWRO Facebook Page. Yes, we do have one of those. I digress. I dutifully looked at my thermometer before I left home. Thirty-eight degrees F. Not too bad. As I made my way down the hill upon which we reside, I could feel the back tire beginning to race the front tire! Not a good feeling. At that moment, I began to take the "T" word very seriously. Traction.

I looked up the definition of traction. Wikipedia says, "Traction, or tractive force, is the force used to generate motion between a body and a tangential surface, through the use of dry friction, though the use of shear force of the surface is also commonly used." Whew... say what? Let's simplify this a bit. Traction is simply friction, between the road surface and the tire as it (the tire) complies with that surface. What we, as riders, must appreciate is that our traction is limited and therefore must be managed.

Now, I could go on *ad nauseam* about this topic. Fortunately for

you dear reader, I am limited to the number of words I may spill in your direction. Traction is function of a great many factors:

- 1) tire composition, temperature, and pressure,
- 2) surface condition,
- 3) braking,
- 4) acceleration, and
- 5) cornering / lean angle.

Let's "brake it down" a little shall we. (pun intended).

#### Lean Angle and Suspension

An expression by one rider about another is often about their "chicken strips"—the unused, pristine outer edge of their tires. You've all heard it, and maybe said it. Understandably, new riders are often reluctant to lean a motorcycle toward modestly aggressive angles. Why? They don't understand the physics of the machine, nor the relationship between lean angle and size of the contact patch. I find Figure 1 very interesting. It shows the relationship between contact patch and increasing lean angle. Remember the greater the lean angle, the less effective the suspension becomes. Suspension has one and only one basic function. That is to keep both tires' contact patch on the riding surface.

#### Tires

Tire types and composition is a science unto itself and all designed for a specific purpose. Not to be discussed here. What can you do to ensure your tires are in their best working order? Check the pressure often! Tires are designed to operate within a specific range of pressure. Too much tire pressure yields a less than optimal contact patch between tire and pavement. Too little pressure will cause excessive friction (read heat), poor handling, and your expensive tires will wear prematurely. My recommendation is to put a reminder in your smart

phone. Let it remind you a few times a month to check your tire pressures. Recall that you *cannot* tell tire pressure by look or feel. Pressure must be measured.

#### **Surface Conditions**

Surface conditions can change as quickly as weather in a mountain pass. Not all surfaces are created equal. Asphalt can be grippy in one place, and slick in another. As you ride, cast your gaze as far ahead as you can see. If you see a change in the surface color and/or texture ahead *always assume* that you are about to enter a limited traction surface, until you feel otherwise. Many newer machines have ABS / lean sensitive ABS, and better yettraction control (TC). Recall, for all these modern marvels to work on your behalf, you must already have a fare degree of traction between tire and pavement.





#### The Traction Pizza

Even when you go for a solo ride, you never ride alone. You always have three invisible "traction passengers" hitching a ride. Like a real passenger they require management. Mr. Acceleration, Mr. Braking, and Ms. Cornering: all of these unseen passengers require traction, and often a lot of it. Think of traction as if it were slices of pizza (After Parks, Lee: Total Control, 2003). Let's assume we have a six-slice pizza (total traction) available. As we enter a corner and begin to lean our motorcycle, Ms. Cornering grabs 3 of the 6 slices of pizza. The more we lean, the more pizza Ms. Cornering grabs. That means that there are only one or two slices on the plate to be shared by Mr. Braking and Mr. Acceleration.





As we exit the curve, the bike begins to right itself. In effect, Ms. Cornering returns pizza back onto the plate. There is now more pizza (traction) for Mr. Acceleration and Mr. Braking. This is why when the need to stop quickly presents itself we always straighten the motorcycle THEN brake. This practice ensures we have maximum traction available for braking. The same applies for hard acceleration.

Failure to manage our finite traction as motorcyclists may result in an unintended dismount, where upon we get to meet Mr. Pavement! At this point traction may result in an entirely different definition.

Head and eyes up!



This rider departed for a trip to South America from Lincoln City on that date, 2015.

Taking the coastal route to avoid mountain snows, Old-man Winter hammered the rider for the first 5 days of this trip with record breaking rainfalls.

This Rider made it into well into Mexico, down through Central and into South America, occasionally accompanied but mostly alone.

With more than a few reported tip overs, a fender bender, a fear of gravel and a dread of cobblestones, and two or three (or Four) cases of travelers diarrhea, this rider tackled adventure with a unique style, perseverance and humor.

This rider is self forgiving and quick to laugh at mishaps. "Oh well" and "a little help here" are common refrains for this go–with– the–flow rider. It is my pleasure to award the 2016 Golden Rider award to everyone's friend: **Lynne Clark**.

I shook my head when I first heard of Lynne's plan to travel southern tip, in December. Alone. What could go wrong?

Following her Facebook posts, we all learned just how far it took to get South America.

Lynne would tell us in several posts; "it's a long, long, long way".

Her honest-to-god trials and tribulations of travel convey her triumph over border crossings, fender benders, bike shipping and customs...with a touch of sarcasm.

#### From Facebook:

...a delivery truck ran into me 4 days ago and I'm still bruised. I was going about 15 mph, and he tried to pass me, but didn't have enough room, clipped my right pannier and spun me into a parked car. There wasn't room for me to go down till he got past me, my rear view mirror was tangled with car's. It was all my fault, since I was riding a motorcycle and I messed up the car and the truck bumper, but since I didn't have insurance, and was not from Columbia, and lost the ability to speak Spanish, they told me to get lost—which I did.

On Lynne went through Central America, where her adventures and mis-adventures unfolded. In some communities she would receive near celebrity status as fans would gather, especially children who loved her two wheeling courage. What a remarkable role model.

Like many of us, Lynne deals with some health conditions—a little thing called Rheumatoid Arthritis—which causes her inflammatory pain. Her medication challenges her immune system and brings about daily ups and down.

But Lynne's determination and perseverance is admirable. She told me once, "I'm going to hurt anyway, I might as well be doing something fun at the same time." What an attitude!

Lynne's trip was remarkable: making it well into Peru, beat up by travelers illness—not once but repeatedly to a point of weakness—she persevered. Laying over for a week here and there, staying long enough to recover, she ultimately flew her bike home—to Florida—where she made a 'quick' cross country journey back to Oregon in May.

Five months on the road, Lynne's story is not of a singular Golden event, but a series of small courageous triumphs. Put them all together, they're pretty darned remarkable.

My salute to you Lynne Clark, our BMWRO 2016 Golden Rider



## Scenic Oregon Backroads Ride to the CJR

Planning on going to the 2017 Chief Joseph Rally? If you enter John Day into your GPS it will map a route on US 26 all the way-209 miles and about 4 hours. Done that how many times? How about trying a different route? One that takes you off the boring busy highway and through some great Oregon back roads. Oregon is such a beautiful state with many incredible motorcycle roads. The "alternate route" described below is 237 miles—about 26 miles and 90 minutes longer, but absolutely worth the extra miles and time. A route filled with scenic beauty, little traffic, and some great twisties.

The alternate route starts just a few miles east of Government Camp off of **Oregon 35**—about 4.7 miles from the intersection of **US 26** and **OR 35** turn right onto **USFS 48**—a nice, two lane paved road through some splendid forest with some great views of Mt. Hood. You'll either see Mt. Hood in your

6 miles away. Before you get to Tyghe Valley you'll get some great views of the hills and farms below in Tyghe Valley. Rather than turning right onto busy US 197-which will take you to Maupin-go across the highway onto Oregon 216. This is a great twisty remote gem of a motorcycle road that should not be missed. About 4 miles from the intersection of US 197 and **OR** 216 on your right is White River Falls State Park. It's a good gravel road to the park but a great place to stretch your legs to walk and see the beautiful White River falls. OR 216 then drops down to the Deschutes River where the **Deschutes River narrowly carves** its way through the rock to only a few feet wide-very impressive sight. The road then snakes its way out of the Deschutes River canyon to wheat fields above and some beautiful rolling straight sections. Turn right—14.5 mi. from White River State Park—onto Ball Rd and then 6 miles later turn left onto **Liberty Rd** rather than following OR 216 farther north where it meets up with US 97.

Next, turn right onto **US 97** and travel the 18.5 miles to Shaiko where you can stop for an ice cream at *Goldies Ice Cream Shoppe*. Across the street from *Goldies* is another incredible motorcycle road—**OR 218**—take it! The ride

mirrors or you'll have to stop to get a great view. USFS 48 will take you all the way to the scenic farm community of Wamic. On your way to Wamic you will notice the forest slowly change from deep fir forests to more open scrub country with oaks. If you're on a GS, there will be lots of tempting gravel side roads to explore. If you're on a K, GT, or RT you'll enjoy the little traffic and scenery. It's 29.6 miles to Wamic. If you want to take a break, about 5.6 miles before you get to Wamic you can stop at beautiful Rock Creek Reservoir.

In Wamic you'll want to turn right onto the **Wamic Market Road** on your way to Tyghe Valley about

from the high plateau around Shaniko to Antelope is filled with exhilarating twisty-tight switchback curves-what fun! The lonely road from Antelope to Fossil is a roller coaster type of ride with little traffic. You'll struggle between catching glimpses of the scenery around you and watching the road as it twists and turns. In no time, you've traveled the 42 miles from Shaniko to Fossil.

You can stop in Fossil—there's services there—or turn right onto the John Day Highway, OR 19, and go on 7 miles and take a quick break at the cool and shady Bear Hollow County Park (drinking water & restrooms) or 3 miles further at Shelton Wavside. The next 25 miles to Spray will drop you down into John Day River canyon country. The scenery and road is fantastic. As you wind your way through the curves along the John Day River perhaps you may notice the "mystery." Mysteriously the road

seems to go downhill but the river seems to be flowing the opposite direction—"uphill." How can that be? It takes a lot of concentration to focus on the many curves that wind along the river versus looking at the river. At Spray you can get refreshment and if needed get some gas (only Regular) at the Country Store.

The next 31 miles to the intersection of the John Day Highway and US 26 continue to be some of the best motorcycle riding anywhere. Again the many twists and turns demand your attention away from the beautiful John Day **River canyon scenery.** Particularly as you approach the John Day Fossil Beds, you catch glimpses of the colorful rock formations before being forced to focus on the curves immediately before you. You quickly realize you can't do both—either enjoy the scenery or rip through the curves. A stop at the Thomas Condon Paleontology

Center provides you with some mental and physical relief after swinging your ride through the corners. Besides that, the fossils on display are pretty darn interesting. Who knew that camels and hippos once roamed the ancient John Day river area.

The last 38 miles of US 26 to John Day you probably already know well. By now you're probably thinking about where to set up your tent and who else you'll see at the CJR. You'll have your own stories to tell as you describe your scenic back-road twisty journey. Each year I go to the CIR, I try and take a different route and always feel so richly rewarded with a great ride.

The GPX (the GPS eXchange Format) file associated with this route is available for download from the BMWRO website.

Teachers in the John Day school system made it an assignment for students in 7th through 12th grades to draw or computer generate a design based on the specifics provided to them by Doug. This resulted in 108 pages of designs received for consideration. The entries were narrowed down to eight entries and then the submissions were voted on by the executive committee in early December. The winning artist received a cash prize of \$100 and the second prize winner was awarded \$25. An article was published in the Blue Mountain Eagle newspaper on January 16, 2017. The designs will be available for viewing at this

coming CJR, with the winning design on the leaflet. Due to the high number of colors, it will not be able to be put on a T-shirt.

 John Fedora, a member of the Juniper Arts Council and retired John Day Fossil Beds Park Ranger, has—for the last three years—led a "Geology Rocks" tour at our rally. Although the BMWRO offers the tour to our members, all proceeds for the ride are given to the Juniper Arts Council. The council encourages and assists aspiring young artists from the area in developing their skills and offers scholarships to many of them.

Cost to those wishing to attend the Chief Joseph Rally this year will remain the same, but the weekend of the event has changed. It will not be held on Father's Day weekend, but on the following weekend instead, June 23–25, 2017.

Club treasurer Linda Tewksbury, gave a brief budget report. The club has an additional \$5,500 at this time over what the club had last year at this time. The executive team is frequently reviewing ways we are doing things and choosing more economical methods, so as to have funds available for more club sponsored activities. An example being, rather than continuing to pay a printing company to print and send out the BB newsletters to those still receiving it by mail, the task was taken over by Linda and in ten months time has cut the costs by over \$1000.
