Temperatures in the area in the end of April are forecasted to be in the high 60's to low 70's during the day and mid 40's at night. This will be a great opportunity to explore a new area with other riders.

A group ride will be arranged for those of you that would like to join in after the lunch and meeting. The route has yet to be determined and more details will be posted as the time approaches.

For those that would like to spend some time in the area, a small block of rooms has been blocked off at the resort with discounted room rates. For one king bed or two queen beds the rate for Saturday night will be \$115 plus room tax and/or \$95 for Sunday night at members own expense. For those of you with motor-homes or travel trailers that wish to bring your home with you, there is a beautiful RV park across the highway, that is part of the resort with 24 hours a day shuttle service. There is also free RV dry camping in one of the Resort's parking lots. The Eyes Have It!

It occurred to me that the elliptical trainer is one of the few things in my life with which I have a love—hate relationship. One half of my brain says, "It's good for you." The other half says, "Who are you trying to kid?" To make this a more "pleasurable" experience, the elliptical faces a rather large flat screen television to distract me from the task at hand.

Since we are in the middle of our off-riding season, I tend to dial up a YouTube video of someone having a good time on a BMW under sunny skies. On this particular occasion I found a video of a gent riding a new RT up Stelvio Pass. Wikipedia tells us, "The Stelvio Pass is a mountain pass in northern Italy, at an elevation of 2,757 m above sea level. It is the highest paved mountain pass in the Eastern Alps. Great, I like good scenery and perhaps I'll ride there someday. The road is narrow and has switchback (hairpin, if you will) after switchback after switchback.

Now, I am not trying to pass myself off as an expert on cornering, however I have a fair bit of training and experience on this subject. I can spot good habits vs. bad habits quite easily. What I spotted in this video was a veritable plethora of bad cornering habits. Routinely, the rider with the GoPro fastened to his helmet failed to:

- 1) use all the available road surface to his advantage,
- 2) used poor apex selection,
- 3) failed to use effective head turns, and
- 4) worst of all, finished his turns in the opposing lane of traffic.

It was his lucky 41 minutes of YouTube fame. He completed all his corners on the way to the pass without encountering an oncoming vehicle.

Paul Simon wrote, "When I look back on all the crap I learned in high school, it's a wonder I can think at all." I can relate. I did have a few useful "take—aways" from those bygone days. Mr. Dan Rowden, my Driver's Ed. teacher, would be proud because a few of his teachings stuck. Dan routinely said, "get the big picture" and "aim high while steering."

Those two pieces of advice are directly translatable to good riding technique. Get the big picture on a motorcycle means *turn your head while cornering*. Look where you want to go. Keep your head turned as you seek the exit of the turn. Aim high in steering on a motorcycle means *keep you head and eyes up*. Find those critical hazards before they find you. Maximize your directional control and stability.

You may recall someone in your riding career telling you to, "use the outside—inside—outside path of travel" while cornering. Good advice but not for all corners.

For very tight corners, such as switchbacks, you need to be guided by a different technique: outside—inside—exit. The rider in the video I referenced above put himself at risk by first and foremost poor apex selection. As you will recall, the apex of a corner is where the motorcyclist places his / her machine closest to the inside of the curve. Often, it is critical that we delay our apex selection in order to set—up for the corner correctly. We call this a late apex.


As a motorcycle instructor, I am fond of asking a student who is exhibiting poor technique, "How do we fix this?" Lets take a look at a few diagrams I produced to stress the importance of lane position and apex selection in tight hairpin curves.

In the following diagrams, green is good. Red is bad. Red represents the path of travel of the rider in the video, and his line of sight.

First, notice the rider has positioned the motorcycle too close to the inside of the curve. He then proceeded to select his curve apex too soon. On a tight switchback curve, such is the one shown, the rider must press the right–hand grip more to initiate more lean. This has the effect of producing a tighter corner. Failing all the above, the motorcyclist is likely to find themselves in the path of oncoming traffic.

Apex Selection On Hairpins

O.K. How do we fix this? *Practice and discipline*. The rider should adopt a path of travel closer to the outside of his lane (green). Next, the apex should be delayed (late apex). The rider now has to press the right hand grip more to initiate greater lean angle to carve a tighter turn. This will keep the rider in the correct lane and avoid oncoming traffic.



Sure, this all sounds great and looks good on paper because it is perfect theory. No other traffic present, and no road surface irregularities. None of this theory can be put into practice without "getting the big picture". You must turn your head.

Let's turn our attention to next diagram showing bad and the good head—turn technique. In the video frame, it was easy to see that the rider was not turning his head. As human beings, we have great binocular vision. Our eyes are set close together with overlapping fields of view. This eye arrangement gives us great depth perception, but a rather lousy field of view. To compensate for the lack of field

of view we MUST turn our heads to gather directional information early and find the exit of the turn. The red wedge on the diagram represents minimal head turn at the selected apex. The consequence is that the rider is not looking where he needs to be in the future. He is looking where he is. Big difference!

Lines Of Sight On Hairpins

The use of maximum effective head turn in the situation as diagramed allows the rider to:

- 1) use his/her entire lane to their advantage,
- 2) find critical hazards early,
- 3) maximize directional control and find that late apex point and
- 4) the exit of the curve. Finally, and

most importantly, proper head turn kept the rider in the correct lane avoiding a potential head on collision with oncoming traffic. Now you too should have a few take—aways, just as I did from Dan's driver's—ed classs.

I want to leave you with a final thought. Someone once asked Yo Yo Ma—arguably the best cellist in the world—why he continued to play scales, that is to say practice. His answer was profound. He said, "Because I've almost got it right!" It is ALL about practice and discipline.

Head and eyes up!

With a well-needed break in the rain and snow, southern Oregon BMWRO Chapter riders got together for the second time this season for a ride that started in the city of Rogue River. Gathering in early morning fog and drizzle for coffee and b-fast, our illustrious group came in from all points of the compass, including Jacksonville, Ashland, the Applegate, Grants Pass and various homeless shelters. Members' bikes ranged from the gas-sipping singles, to the Adventure Series—notorious for their dent in the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, once filled to the envy of afore-mentioned endurance-challenged singles. As this was just our second ride after a long delay dating back to February of this year—we inched out cautiously and slooooowly, as we made our way along the River into Grants Pass and out the back door toward Hugo and eventually, Wolf Creek.

Chief Joseph Rally—2017 Only the Stalwart Need Apply

It is true that we did not have enough people to help set-up the tipi at last year's Chief Joseph Rally. It was not well–planned and less than a handful of volunteers knew how to set up a tipi—okay, only one person knew how. I would like to say in my own defense, that the expected rain fall drove off most of the volunteers after it started getting dark; and we still had not tied the structure together. The canvas portion was spread out on the grass ready for the final step of lifting it into place—a mistake that will not be repeated. When the lightening became truly enthusiastic, my volunteers headed for shelter. As a result, the weight of the lift pole with the wet canvas

was too heavy for one person to lift into place. I cannot say that I blame my crew for leaving me out there alone, unable to complete the task. But I also must say that it showed a complete lack of team work. It's only when the going gets tough that one shows their true colors—and their's was the yellow belly color of self-serving cowards.

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

This time our intrepid group numbered 10 on 8 bikes. **Chris Henry** is fast becoming Mr. Stalwart, braving early mornings and fallible forecasts to join us all the way from Eugene. Our one-hour-later start time was fast becoming our usual appointed hour, though that will



end now that daylight savings time is again upon us. After a quick hello and head-count, we loaded up and headed out. Right into our biggest downpour of the season.

As we hopped on I-5 south, it seemed like we were in for a slog. Black skies dominated every horizon. But a funny thing happened. As we made our way east onto I-205, the skies—and the rain—lightened. Ten minutes later, the pavement was dry and we were off to the races!

Our route this month took us south and east. Estacada is for many a "pass-through" community, where one rarely ventures past the Shell Station at the south end of town, the last fuel on the Ripplebrook road to Detroit. But the roads to Estacada are twisty and rural, making it the perfect destination for an early-season outing without getting too far away from greater Portland.

We exited I-205 at exit 10, then quickly dove onto Redland Road. Out here, neighborhoods mingle with farm country. Cooperative was formed in 1992 by nine local artists who came together for a local exhibition. Their first show was so well-received that they decided to bring art and the community together. Since 1994, they have painted 24 murals around town; we posed in front of their third mural. Entitled "The Cycle of Wood", it was designed by Joe Cotter and is displayed on the east wall on Main Street, just north of the restaurant. Since 2000, Estacada has hosted a summer arts and music festival, on the fourth weekend

in July, the centerpiece of which is Artback's annual mural-in-aweekend project.

We barely escaped with our helmets closed before the rain resumed. But again, it lasted only a few minutes. We meandered through Eagle Fern Park on our way to Sandy, then on to Jonsrud Viewpoint, where we took a last photo and bid each other a safe ride home. All agreed it was another fine outing.
